A very active life member of the ROCKS, LTC Rogers started two separate ROCKS Chapters at both FT Lewis and FT Gordon, was very active in the European Chapter, and has initiated a an informal ROCKS Interest Group in Saudi Arabia. LTC Michael Rogers assumed his duties as Commander of the Defense Contracting Management Agency in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in July 2004. His organization provides contract administration support for 58 foreign military sales contracts valued at 1.74 billion dollars which directly supports the combat capabilities of the Saudi Arabian Armed Forces and U.S. Forces in the execution of national military strategy in the Middle East. he also serves in a program integrator capacity for Air Force, Army, and Navy security assistance buying commands with Saudi Ministry of Defense and Aviation (MODA) customers and the contractors who deliver the products and services. Commissioned in 1986 from UNC. LTC Rogers has excelled in a multitude of assignments from ambulance platoon leader to his current position in Saudi Arabia. No stranger to deployments in harm's way, he deployed to Somalia serving as the Chief, Medical Supply Operations for Medical Task Force 42nd in 1994. Dedicated to the Rocks creed of selfless service and going beyond the call of duty, his key accomplishments in his command have been: He was hand-picked by Maj Gen Larry Twitchell, Chief, USMTM to lead a capstone delegation of twelve U.S. flag officers representing the Army, Air

Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard on a Saudi plant visit to Advanced Electronics Corporation (AEC). This visit served to market DCMA's combat support agency role on Foreign military sales contracts and capability to support demonstrate AEC's defense contracts while breaking new ground with respect to the Kingdom's Saudization He transformed his command to efforts. Performance Based Management bar in the Contract (PBM). Raised the Management Office by establishing a Campaign Plan for the implementation of PBM, and then executed the implementation. First to develop Customer Relations Plans (CRPs) with metrics for all program managers he supports. He also educated the five largest customers (AMCOM-Patriot and RSLFAC, TACOM, ESC, and WRALC) during personal visits with PCOs on PBM which solidified their buy-in and support. Giving Back

Lieutenant Shares his Experiences with HR Chapter

The Hampton Roads (HR) Chapter of the Rocks, Inc., had a special guest participate in their June 7th General Membership Meeting, and Officer Professional Development Program. 1LT Avon Cornelius (pictured), a 2003 Army ROTC Graduate of Hampton University (HU), and a native of Hampton, Va., was home for two weeks R&R from Iraq, where he has been since August 2004. 1LT Cornelius is an Infantry Platoon Leader, with the 2nd Infantry Division. Commissioned in May 2003, 1LT Cornelius completed his Infantry Basis Course in Dec 2003, attended a couple of follow-on courses. such as the Mortar Leaders Course, and the Mechanized Leaders Course, then was assigned to the 2nd Infantry Division's Second Brigade, in Korea. However, shortly after arriving in Korea in Jun 2004, his brigade was deployed to Iraq, where he has been since then.

1LT Cornelius took the time out of his tight schedule to come back to HU, where the HR Chapter meets, and shared with the Chapter Members and guest, his experiences during his 24 month career, which includes 10 months in combat. He recalled how he and his fellow cadets at Hampton University would sometimes complain about how hard training was, especially training administered by MAJ Barry Flye, a former HU Grad, who was his MSIII instructor. However, he is now glad for that tough training, as it has served him well in the combat zone. Asked what advice he would give new lieutenants, Cornelius said: Train Hard; Be

Prepared; Listen to your Platoon Sergeant; Don't make changes to soon; Observe first, then adjust as needed.

1LT Cornelius will return to Iraq next week to join his unit, following which time he will soon begin redeployment back to CONUS. His 2nd Brigade Combat Team will be stationed at Ft. Carson, Co.

Madigan Changes Command

A new General arrived Tuesday to lead Madigan Army Medical Center through what will likely be a time of change at one of the U.S. military's busiest hospitals.

Brig. Gen. Sheila Baxter assumed command from Brig. Gen. Michael Dunn, who is retiring to lead genetic research in Pennsylvania and advise the Page 5 Summer 2005

Bush administration on homeland security issues. In Dunn, 58, the region is losing "a great leader, a great commander and a great physician," said Lt. Gen. Kevin Kiley, the Army Surgeon General. But he said Baxter is "a highly trained, bright and capable officer, as you will come to know here."

The new commander, 50, is a native of small-town Virginia, a college basketball star, the first woman to lead Madigan and in her private life a licensed evangelist in the Church of God in Christ.

Baxter also is a medical logistics officer; most Army hospital commanders are doctors.

Retired Brig. Gen. Mack Hill - one of the more than 20 active and retired general officers who turned out for Tuesday's change of command ceremony was the first non doctor to run Madigan. He led the center from 1998-2000.

In the mid-1990s Army medical leaders took a cue from the civilian world, he said. "If we have trained and properly developed leaders, why not open it up to not just doctors, but nurses, medical service officers, what have you?" Hill said.

Lt. Col. Mike Ryan, Madigan's assistant chief of staff for logistics, was Baxter's executive officer when she commanded the 229th Medical Logistics Battalion in Pirmasens, Germany. He said relating with people is her strength.

"She's really good in the community. People will like her," Ryan said.

The local government honored her for her community service after a second tour in Pirmasens as commander of the U.S. Army Medical Materiel Center, Europe.

Baxter comes to Madigan from Fort Sam Houston, where she was assistant surgeon general and deputy chief of staff for force sustainment at the U.S. Army Medical Command. She's a veteran of the first Persian Gulf war and peacekeeping operations in Bosnia.

It's her first assignment at Fort Lewis in her 27year career. Madigan serves the more than 60,000 military retirees who live in the area and the 22,000 or so active-duty soldiers and their families at Fort Lewis.

But wounded and injured soldiers from Iraq and Afghanistan are the hospital's biggest priority these days. Madigan has cared for more than 7,000 soldiers who were either hurt or fell ill while serving in the war.

Meantime, Madigan also is working to keep up with deployments among its staff of more than 1,200 doctors and nurses and the arrival of new units at Fort Lewis.

By this fall, the hospital likely will have to roll out controversial new work rules - the National Security Personnel System - for its 1,900 civilian federal employees.

And Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld has proposed that Madigan take over management of medical care at neighboring McChord Air Force Base. The Base Closure and Realignment Commission is considering the recommendation.

Baxter said she's confident Madigan will be able to manage whatever turbulence the changes might bring.

The Madigan commander also leads the Western Regional Medical Command, with responsibility for active-duty Army health care in six Western states, and the military's TriCare health-care plan across all service branches in the Puget Sound region.

Baxter said she began her ministry while she was stationed in Germany and expects she will pursue it as a second career when she leaves the military. She said she feels called by God "to do my best to help people."

The new commander made the rounds on the graveyard shift Saturday and in her four days here has begun to get to know the people and the place. She said when her new posting was first announced last month, "I got 10 e-mails from people saying, 'You're going to a great place."

History of the ROCKS, Inc.

During the mid 1960s, a group of Army officers assigned to the Command and General Staff College (CGSC) at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, began to meet informally in order to get to know each other better. Many of these officers had known each other in college or during other assignments. They, of course, had one additional thing in common at the time – how to "survive" at Fort Leavenworth. The group jokingly dubbed itself the "BLUE GEESE," a term well known at CGSC as the vehicle used to convey a special assignment to a student officer. When the school year ended, the group discovered that many were being assigned to the pentagon and other places in the greater Washington area.

Upon reaching Washington, several informal meetings followed. However, the emphasis was modified to deal with survival in the National Capitol Region and to address other issues of interest to the members. During the years which followed, many officers were reassigned in and out of the Washington area so the group continued to grow. The need for a more structured organization was also seen, so a formal meeting was held on October 9, 1974, to get the group formalized. Those present decided to call themselves the "No Name Club."

One of the later meetings was held on December 1, 1974, with the expressed purpose of naming the group. General Roscoe (Rock) C. Cartwright and his wife, Gloria, had been in Columbus, Ohio visiting their daughter and Rock was expected at the meeting. It was then that the group received the shocking news that the plane on which the Cartwrights were returning had crashed enroute to Dulles airport with no survivors. During the period of mourning, the Cartwright family requested that instead of flowers, a scholarship fund be established in the name of their parents. This resulted in the establishment of the Roscoe C. Cartwright Scholarship Fund to provide financial assistance to students who excel academically.

During the month of December 1974, at a special meeting following the funeral, the organization gathered and voted unanimously to administer the Roscoe C. Cartwright Scholarship Fund and to name itself the "ROCKS," the name that we affectionately knew as one of our Geese and Charter member, Brigadier General Roscoe C. Cartwright.
